Enjoy an enticing mix on this seven day itinerary, hopping off the train along the way to enjoy the majestic mountains of the Lake District, explore Roman ruins and ancient castles and soak up the culture in two very distinctive cities.

DAY 1-3 | LAKE DISTRICT

Your journey starts in Manchester. Begin by rolling through the Cumbrian countryside that inspired Beatrix Potter and William Wordsworth before arriving in Windermere, a market town set on the shores of England's longest lake and the perfect base for exploring shimmering lakes and rugged hills. Home to England's tallest mountain, Scafell Pike, be sure to pack your walking boots.

DAY 4 | CARLISLE AND HADRIAN'S WALL

Nearby and perched on the border of England and Scotland, the city of Carlisle is one of the gateways to the UNESCO World Heritage site Hadrian's Wall. Stretching 73 miles, it is an unmissable relic from when Romans ruled the land and a walker's paradise.

DAY 5 | NEWCASTLE

Head to the cosmopolitan city of Newcastle for a taste of the famous Geordie spirit (and Newcastle Brown Ale), immortalised by the gigantic Angel of the North sculpture. Sample the city's night-life, restaurants and shopping, and learn about its heritage via local museums and elegant Victorian buildings.

DAY 6-7 | YORK

The last stop is charming York, an hour south of Newcastle by train. A place of extraordinary cultural and historical wealth, this beautifully preserved medieval city is home to delights such as the timber-framed houses of The Shambles and the imposing architecture of York Minster and Castle Howard.

Alwick Castle, Alwick

SET IN THE RUGGED COUNTRYSIDE OF **NORTHUMBERLAND** IN THE NORTH EAST OF ENGLAND, **ALWICK CASTLE** IS THE SECOND LARGEST INHABITED CASTLE IN ENGLAND AND HAS BEEN HOME TO THE DUKE OF NORTHUMBERLAND'S FAMILY FOR OVER 700 YEARS

Combining magnificent medieval architecture with its spectacular Italianate State Rooms, the castle is home to one of the finest private art collections in the country. Including extensive works by Titian, Van Dyck, Turner, and Dobson. There is also an impressive display of Chelsea and Paris porcelain in the China Gallery.

Film and TV buffs will enjoy the 'Alwick on Location' tour, which takes in the castle's cinematic history with appearances in Downton Abbey and Harry Potter. Alwick Castle featured as Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry in the first two Harry Potter films.

Open throughout April - October.

HOW TO GET THERE

The London King's Cross - Edinburgh train stops at Alnmouth train station (four miles from Alwick Castle). This train journey takes approximately 3hrs 30mins.

A taxi or bus (X18) can be taken from Alnmouth train station (a journey of approximately 10mins).

It's easy to get here by train from London Paddington. The nearest train station is St Austell and takes approximately 4hrs 20mins. From here take the regular number 101 bus that runs direct taking around 20mins.

It's easy to see why the sunny South West is one of England's most popular holiday destinations. An eight-day tour of the region's highlights, from the beautiful UNESCO World Heritage city of Bath to the unmissable Eden Project in Cornwall, via the arty city of Bristol, can only be completed with a traditional fish supper on a St Ives beach. It is easily accessible by train and public transport.

DAY 1-2 | BATH

With its sweep of Georgian buildings and historic Roman Baths, Bath is an ideal first stop for a few days relaxation and pottering around the beautiful city's independent shops. Wallow as the Romans did in the hot, mineral-rich spring waters of the modern Thermae Bath Spa complex and visit the majestic Royal Crescent.

DAY 3 | BRISTOL

Next stop is the laid-back city of Bristol for a glimpse of its graceful architecture and offbeat culture. Famous as the birthplace of Banksy, take a tour of the city's street art, relax in the renovated Victorian spa and indulge in gastronomy of every flavour in trendy revamped warehouses.

DAY 4-5 | ST AUSTELL

Stop off in the market town of St Austell for a night or two to visit the nearby Eden Project, Lost Gardens of Heligan and St Austell Brewery. Learn all about the China clay industry at Wheel Martyn Museum or take a walk along golden beaches where water-sports enthusiasts can get soaked.

DAY 6-8 | ST IVES

Finish your journey with fish and chips and Cornish ice cream in the beautiful seaside town of St Ives. Home to a thriving artistic community, visit Tate St Ives and take in white-washed cottages, sandy beaches and a harbour that inspired artists J M W Turner and Henry Moore.

Expect vistas of dramatic scenery through your train window on this six-day itinerary. Starting in the capital of Edinburgh to soak up some culture, hop off the train at any of Scotland's six other cities, each with their own distinct personality and history, to discover more of Scotland.

Whichever route you choose, you'll discover a land of fascinating history, natural beauty, wildlife and heritage, all aching to be explored.

DAY 1-2 | EDINBURGH

Begin your journey in Scotland's capital, Edinburgh - a city bound to leave a lasting impression with its fairytale architecture, sophisticated cultural life and enviable eateries. After a day or two of museum-hopping and people-watching, from here it's a quick 1hr 15min train journey to Perth.

DAY 3 | PERTH

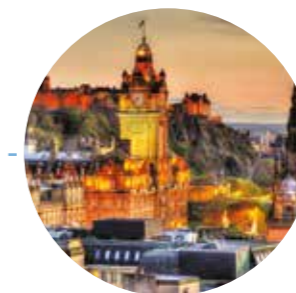
Once the capital of Scotland, today Perth is known for its fantastic food scene, offering everything from pop-up experiences to fine dining feasts. Positioned in the heart of the country and sitting on the banks of the River Tay, it's also an ideal place from which to experience the surrounding countryside.

DAY 4-5 | INVERNESS

Get an early start for a 2hr 15min journey to Inverness. From pink Inverness Castle to the legendary waters of Loch Ness (see page 19 for travel info), this small city is a great base for adventure lovers, with plenty of opportunities for hiking, climbing and water sports in the mountains and lochs around.

MOUNT STUART, ISLE OF BUTE

Set amidst 300 acres of gloriously landscaped gardens on the Isle of Bute, the house itself is arguably the finest piece of domestic architecture to emerge from Britain's Gothic Revival in the 19th century. The mansion boasts a majestic marble hall, white marble chapel, rich reception rooms and grounds to explore.

HOW TO GET THERE

From Edinburgh it's a 2hr 20min train to Wemyss Bay, where you can get the ferry, or from Glasgow it's a 50min train to Wemyss Bay. The ferry crossing over to Rothesay, Isle of Bute, takes 35mins and with sailings approximately every 45mins at peak times. No booking is required. **Open throughout April - October.**

STIRLING CASTLE

Sitting proudly atop a volcanic rock and historically known as the brooch that held Scotland together is Stirling Castle, where you can come face-to-face with characters from the past. Revel in its Renaissance magnificence and views of the surrounding Scottish countryside from the castle's ramparts.

HOW TO GET THERE

From Edinburgh it's a 50min direct train journey to Stirling and a 10-15min stroll to the castle.

Open throughout the whole year.

DALWHINNIE

Through steep ravines, gushing burns and tree-clad hilltops up to the mountains, past vast lochs and red deer, the first sign of life in this old landscape is Dalwhinnie Distillery: the highest and coldest Scotch whisky distillery in the world, where some of the finest spirits on the planet are made.

HOW TO GET THERE

From Edinburgh it's a 2hr 20min direct train journey to Dalwhinnie. **Open throughout the whole year.**

LOCH NESS

Catch the train from Edinburgh, London or Manchester to one of Scotland's most famous locations: the mysterious Loch Ness. At its deepest point it's 232m deep - so you could stack two Big Bens on top of each other and they wouldn't touch the surface. It's rumoured to be home to the elusive Loch Ness Monster, and in the Loch Ness Centre & Exhibition you can see the many misty photographs and accounts of possible monster sightings recorded over the years. But even if you don't spot it you

can still have an incredible time on a boat trip across this huge loch, taking in the local wildlife - from osprey to golden eagles and red deer - and the spectacular Highland scenery. This is also an ideal location for walkers and mountain bikers. Make sure you pay a visit to the atmospheric ruins of 13th century Urquhart Castle while you're here, once a focal point for fierce inter-clan battles. Climb up The Grant Tower for beautiful views over the loch and see if you can spot anything unusual in the waters.

HOW TO GET THERE

From Edinburgh it's a 3hr 30min train journey direct to Inverness, which is the nearest station to Loch Ness (approx. 13 miles north). Buses leave from Inverness three times daily Monday through Friday, and twice per day on Saturdays. These buses will take you to Foyers, a town on the east side of the loch, where you'll find trails to explore and accommodations if you'd like to stay the night.

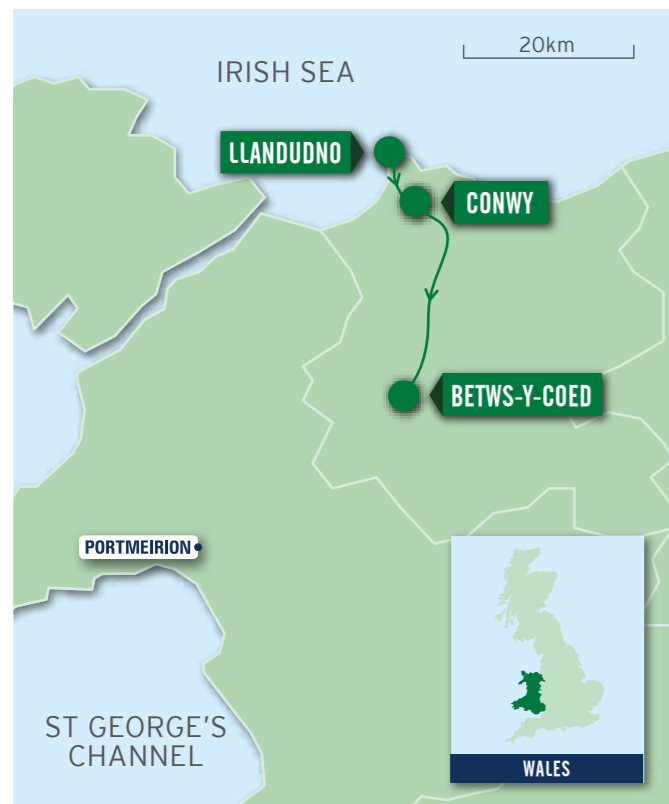

NORTH WALES IS A PLAYGROUND FOR THRILL SEEKERS, A HIDEOUT FOR STARGAZERS AND A GOLD MINE FOR HERITAGE EXPLORERS



Alongside UNESCO World Heritage sites such as Conwy, Beaumaris, Harlech and Caernarfon Castles, North Wales is home to seaside towns, romantic gardens and some of the best walking and cycling in Britain. And if that's not enough, it's all set against the jaw-dropping backdrop of the Snowdonia mountains.

North Wales has reinvented itself to create a series of truly world-class attractions, from high-speed zip lining and inland surfing to underground trampolining in a 176-year-old disused slate mine.

DAY 1 | LLANDUDNO

Wales' biggest beach resort, visitors have been flocking to beautiful Llandudno since Victorian times. With two sandy beaches, a pier, promenade and even Punch and Judy shows, it's the quintessential British seaside experience.

DAY 2 | CONWY

Conwy's mighty castle and town walls make it one of the best preserved medieval towns in Britain. The views from battlements stretching across Snowdonia's mountains and coast are stunning.

DAY 3-5 | BETWS-Y-COED & SNOWDONIA

Under 30mins by train from Llandudno Junction is the lovely stone village of Betws-y-Coed, the perfect base for exploring Snowdonia National Park. Breathe in the fresh air on a wander through Gwydyr Forest before tucking into some locally sourced food.

Hop on the train to Blaenau Ffestiniog, home to pulse-raising activities from zip wires to mountain biking. For a gentler way to admire the vast mountains, lakes and forests of Snowdonia, take the Ffestiniog Railway to Porthmadog.

Soar 500ft in the air at 100miles per hour at Zipworld Velocity, play on trampolines at a subterranean playground in a former slate cavern at Bounce Below or see the countryside in a completely different way by flying up to 60m above the forest floor at Betws-y-Coed's Zipworld forest.

UNESCO WORLD HERITAGE SITES

The trail of Edward I's magnificent castles and town walls of Beaumaris, Conwy, Caernarfon and Harlech are some of the finest examples of military architecture in Europe. It's the highest aqueduct in Britain - walk across it or take a leisurely boat ride.

The centre, with its own restaurant and tearoom, also hosts a range of activities from bee-keeping demonstrations to cookery classes.

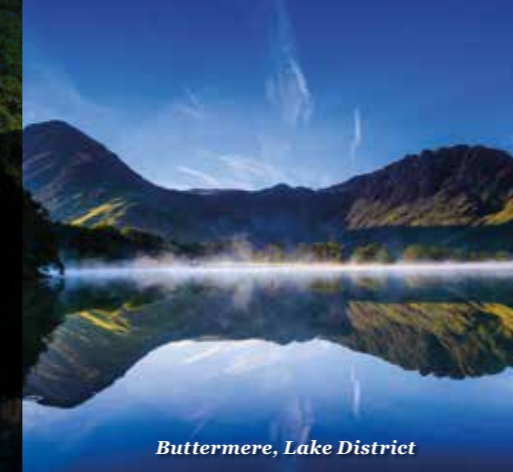




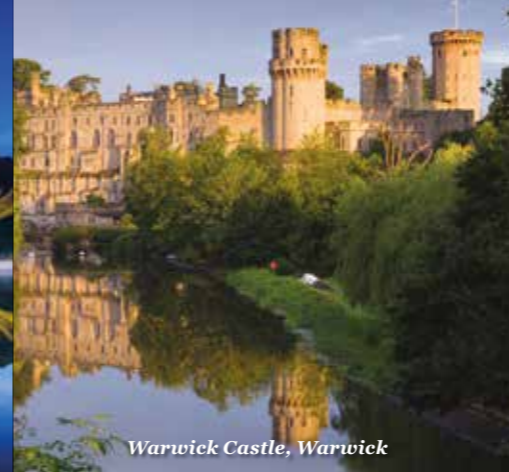

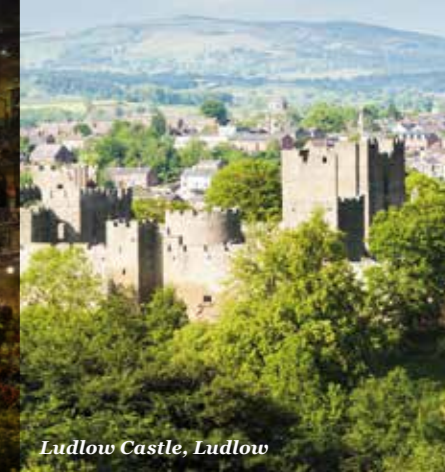
